Camp Director Report

Dear Campers, Parents, Sponsors, Contributors and Stakeholders,

Fearless Xtreme Leadership and Prevention Camp 2020 was a testament of the resiliency of the Cayman Islands Youth Development Consortium. Especially, at a time such as the Corona Virus Pandemic, we are grateful to all the sponsors, contributors and supporters that continue to support our organization. Even though we were aware of the hesitancy of some parents allowing their children to attend because of the fear of contracting the virus, we scheduled camp for four weeks, thinking that there would still be a demand or need for parents to get their children out of the house. Another reason for scheduling it for this duration was to provide more activities that would cater to the psychological needs of the campers.

Decreased funding, limited ways to distribute information and the inability of our itinerant volunteer camp counselors being able to help us this year, meant being very creative, so that we could cost effectively meet the needs of our young people coming out of months of lock down. Although there was some challenges with the heat, the Lions Centre was the perfect location to help us adhere to COVID 19 protocols. Everyday campers temperatures were checked on arrival and the groups were set up to facilitate physical distancing. Each day constant reminders had to be given and adjustments made to help the students cope while adhering to the protocols as well.

Doing the general session presentations were challenging as we were not able to use audio visual aids and the COVID 19 protocol spacing provided a challenge for coordinating group activities. Nonetheless, camp counselors and campers made the best of the situation to make camp an enjoyable one. Even though our total attendance ended up being less than half of last year's total attendance, we are grateful and honored that we were able to host our annual camp.

A highlight of camp this year was our service to others project that was done in partnership with the Lion's Club of Grand Cayman. Some of their members helped the campers package food items from their pantry, which was then distributed to the Cayman Islands Government Needs Assessment Unit and to vulnerable individuals in the George Town and West Bay district.

Learning critical lessons from the previous years of camp we continue to experience major improvements in our program and witness the growth and development of our campers. Each camper have their own challenges and every year new issues surface that we have to address. As we continue to serve our young people in this program we realize that we have to be cognizant of their needs and provide the quality of service to help them take full advantage of what is offered.



Summary - DEVELOPMENTAL ASSETS PRESENTATIONS


During the first week campers were introduced to the developmental assets. To reinforce the information shared the campers did activities on each asset category and worked on an asset village during the second week.














Summary - MAKING RIGHT CHOICES PRESENTATIONS
